

Brrrr—it's cold outside!
The following guidelines will help you protect your companion animals when

the mercury dips.
Keep your cats inside.

Outdoors, felines can freeze, become lost or be stolen, injured or killed. Cats who are allowed to stray are exposed to infectious diseases, including rabies, from other cats, dogs and wildlife.

During the winter, outdoor cats sometimes sleep under the hoods of cars. When the motor is started, the cat can be injured or killed by the fan belt. If there are outdoor cats in your area, bang loudly on the car hood before starting the engine to give the cat a chance to escape.

Never let your dog off the leash on snow or ice, especially during a snowstorm, dogs can lose their scent and easily become lost. More dogs are lost during the winter than during any other season, so make sure yours always wears ID tags.

Thoroughly wipe off your dog's legs and stomach when he comes in out of the sleet, snow

or ice. He can ingest salt, antifreeze or other potentially dangerous chemicals while licking his paws, and his paw pads may also bleed from snow or encrusted ice.

Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter, as a longer coat will provide more warmth. When you bathe your dog in the colder months, be sure to completely dry him before taking him out for a walk. Own a short-haired breed? Consider getting him a coat or sweater with a high collar or turtleneck with coverage from the base of the tail to the belly. For many dogs, this is regulation winter wear

Never leave your dog or cat alone in a car during cold weather. A car can act as a refrigerator in the winter, holding in the cold and causing the animal to freeze to death.

Puppies do not tolerate the cold as well as adult dogs, and may be difficult to housebreak during the winter. If your puppy appears to be sensitive to the weather, you may opt to paper-train him inside. If your dog is sensitive to the cold due to age, illness or breed type, take him outdoors only to relieve himself.

Does your dog spend a lot of time outdoors? Increase his supply of food, particularly protein, to keep him, and his fur, in tip-top shape. Routinely check your pet's

make certain the water is fresh and unfrozen. Use plastic food and water bowls rather than metal; when the temperature is low, your pet's tongue can stick and freeze to metal.

Like coolant, antifreeze is a lethal poison for dogs and cats. Be sure to thoroughly clean up any spills from your vehicle, and consider using

products that contain propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol. Go to the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center at www.aspca.org/pet-care/poison-control/ for more information.

Make sure your companion animal has a warm place to sleep, off the floor and away from all drafts. A cozy dog or cat bed with a warm blanket or pillow is perfect.

The best tip of all: keep your pets with

you. Probably the best prescription for winter's woes is to keep your dog or cat inside with you and your family. The happiest dogs are those who are taken out frequently for walks and exercise, but kept inside the rest of the time.

From the start of the fiscal year of August 30, 2012 through November 30, 2012, the Calaveras Humane Society, thanks to a grant from the Wintercreek Foundation and matching funds from the CHS, gave residents of Calaveras County more than \$52,430 to assist in the spaying

and neutering of 897 dogs and cats.

- Through the CHS Foster Cat Program, a total 143 cats found forever homes or were transferred to other cat rescue organizations in need of cats.
- Through the CHS Foster Dog Program, a total of 19 dogs found forever homes or were placed in other rescue organizations.

When Sherry Mata and her son, Edward, pulled off the highway after seeing a Calaveras Humane Society Adopt-A-Thon sign, they had no idea they were about to meet the next member of their family. Sherry and 11-year-old Edward, traveling from Newark to

Mountain Ranch, had previously talked about adopting an adult cat so it seemed like the right time to stop. The mother and son took their time looking at all the adults and narrowed their choice to two. Before making a final decision, they submitted an application to get the adoption process started and headed home to consult with Dad.

The family was thrilled when they received a call a few days later with news that their application was approved. The family decided to adopt Bree, an orange tabby female, who had

NEW SHELTER NEWS

It's finally here. The New Shelter Committee has selected a final site for the new animal shelter. The brush has been cleared, the paddocks are in place and the members of Calaveras County Board of Supervisors have walked the site. The next step is for the supervisors to cast the final vote. The committee expects to have the board of supervisor's approval and a study session to lay out the plan of action to proceed with the capital campaign in January. The capital campaign cannot start until the land is committed.

The final location waiting for the board of supervisor's approval is located on land behind

the current shelter across from the new jail.

The New Shelter Committee is enjoying working with Brain Moss as the New Shelter Project moves forward. Brian is the Director of the Calaveras County Environmental Health Department. Calaveras County recently moved the county's animal services division from the Sheriff's office to the Environmental Health Department. Under Brian's leadership, the county is adding staff and a new shelter director should be on board after the first of the year.

The committee is asking for everyone's support as it moves forward. The committee will send an email to those interested in appearing on the CHS' behalf to support its request for final approval on the site. •

Dear Doc

My dog has a habit of licking a spot on one of her front legs until all the hair is gone and the skin is red and raw. Why does she do this, especially when there doesn't seem to be anything there for her to lick? Thank you, I am looking forward to your answer. Sally in Arnold

Dear Sally,

The condition you describe is called Acral Lick Granuloma (ALD) and it is among the top 10 most common dermatological diseases in the dog. ALD is frustrating, painful and miserable to the dog and expensive to treat. It responds poorly to treatment and frequently reoccurs. Treatment success ranges from 20 to 65%.

ALD is characterized by self-traumatizing licking that results in a progressive development of a well-circumscribed, firm, proliferative, erosive/ulcerative, alopecic plaque or nodules on the lower portion of the limb. The carpus (wrist) and less commonly the rear legs are involved. The appearance and size can be quite variable. Any breed can be affected but there is a predisposition to large breed dogs with short hair coats such as Dobermans, Labrador Retrievers, Boxers and Great Danes. Other breeds such as German Shepherds and Golden Retrievers are affected.

The causes of ALD are complex and multi-

factorial. To simplify the understanding, all causes and contributing factors can be divided into three categories: 1) predisposing factors; 2) primary factors; and 3) perpetuating factors.

Predisposing factors are large shorthaired breeds. Primary factors are food allergies, atopic dermatitis, osteoarthritis, trauma, neoplasia, fungal infection, foreign body, neuropathy or behavioral disorders. Perpetuating factors are deep bacterial infections, entrapped hair shafts that cause inflammation and infection, skin gland inflammation, fibrosis and reinforced behavior.

The diagnosis is made from the location and appearance of the lesion, but x-rays, and/or bacterial cultures may be needed especially if there is no response to treatment. X-rays can tell us if there is arthritis or possibly cancer. Culture and sensitivities tell us if we are using the appropriate antibiotic. Biopsy and histopathology may be needed to rule out other causes such as cancer or mange, for example.

Treatment is focused on three components: 1) management of the primary cause; 2) effective antibiotic treatment with correct drug and correct length of treatment; and 3) prevention of ongoing licking. Management of the primary cause is critical to prevent the reoccurrence of the lesions.

The treatment will vary depending on the pet's condition. Long-term antibiotics are usually administered for a minimum of four weeks past clinical signs. Both topical anti-inflammatory and antibiotic therapy can be used. The use of an anti-inflammatory agent is important because these lesions are very painful.

Occasionally psycho active drugs may be needed to control licking. Omega-3 fatty acids supplementation has also been recommended. Most pets will benefit from increased aerobic activity and interactions with the owners. Decreasing the amount of food has been shown to be helpful. Since some of the root causes are often related to anxiety or boredom, increasing interaction and stimulation is often strongly recommended. In some severe cases of Acral Lick Granuloma, surgery and/or laser treatment may be needed. While this condition is difficult to treat and can be frustrating to get under control, most cases of Acral Lick Granuloma can be successfully treated with the proper extended testing and treatments.

Overweight Pets More than half of U.S. dogs and cats are overweight. These pets are at a higher risk for developing serious medical problems, including arthritis, diabetes, breathing problems, and some forms of cancer. So how can you slim down your supersized pet and reduce the risk of these diseases? The answer is easier than you think.

1. SIZE UP YOUR PET Ask your veterinarian about your pet's body condition score (or BCS). Using the BCS scale, your veterinarian can easily determine whether your pet is underweight, or right on track. As a rule, you should be able to feel (but not see) your pet's ribs through a thin layer of fat

and see a defined "waist" between the ribs and hips.

2. MEASURE MEALS Too many pet owners simply fill the bowl or estimate how much they're feeding. But did you know that once a cat has received the calories he needs (typically less than 300 per day), adding just one extra teaspoon of dry food each day can add up to a pound of weight gain in a year? Keep in mind that for the average 10-pound cat, this is a 10 percent weight gain!

3. EXERCISE Exercise and good nutrition are powerful partners to help your pet live a long and healthy life. For dogs, as little as 20 to 30 minutes of daily brisk walking is all it takes to boost immune function, improve cardiovascular health, and reduce many behavioral problems. For cats, try playing chase (using a laser pointer [avoid the eyes], remote-controlled toy, or ball of paper) for five to 15 minutes each day.
